

Foreign Policy Is Mrs. Eaton's Issue

MRS. CYRUS S. EATON of Cleveland, who is campaigning for a delegate position at the Democratic national convention, believes the real issue in the presidential campaign should be international relations and foreign policy.

She is here with her 16-year-old daughter, Lissy Jones, and her husband, the well known industrialist. Mrs. Eaton said in an interview yesterday that she does not think any candidate will go to the convention with a majority of the delegates. Who is her favorite?

Still Undecided.

"I haven't really made my mind up," she said. "It is too early. A good many things may occur in international relations which may effect the thinking of many of the delegates."

But the attractive, articulate woman is determined to have a voice in the presidential selection.

"I'm the daughter of Probate Judge Walter Kinder and the granddaughter and great-granddaughter of judges, all Democrats," she said. "With

Mrs. Eaton is campaigning at Democratic meetings prior to the May 3 Ohio primary election. She has been named a candidate for delegate-at-large by Governor Di Salle. The slate is committed to him as a favorite son, but he has indicated his support for Sen. John F. Kennedy.

Sharing with her husband a concern over the armament race, Mrs. Eaton is urging women to call for "controlled world disarmament, a ban on nuclear tests and an honest and responsible approach to co-operation with other nations."

wash, Nova Scotia, for scientists of the world, including those behind the Iron and Bamboo curtains.

Lissy ran the tape recorder for the conference on chemical and biological warfare last summer.

Lissy, who is a sophomore at Madeira school, outside Washington, is looking forward to visiting the Truman Library today with her mother, while Eaton attends a meeting of the library trustees.

"I am looking forward most to seeing the replica of President Truman's office in the White House," Lissy said. "It will all be interesting for American history is my favorite field."
