

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WHEN Canadian-born U.S. industrialist Cyrus Eaton convened his sixth annual Pugwash Conference in Nova Scotia recently to discuss the world's problems, he told the 24 delegates from 11 lands: "Some politicians want the intellectuals of the world to be silent, but I have been eager for them to speak up."

In the days that followed many of them did just that, as quotes on these pages indicate. The chief topics for discussion were adult education, mass communication and aid to underdeveloped countries, but the sharpest barbs were aimed at politicians who, as Eaton himself put it, "are shoving us inevitably towards hopeless, helpless nuclear war."


